County Commissioner Report

The last 12 months have focussed on adventure, awards, and a handover!

A couple years ago we decided we'd like to try our hand at something a bit different and so for the first time we had a County group go to a jamboree down south. We had a group of 14 go to Larkin 2024 during the summer—which was a week-long Guide/Scout jamboree in North Yorkshire. I had the pleasure of being part of the team and loved every second! The weather really showed up for us and we had a fantastic time. We met old friends, and made some new friends; we visited the historic city of York; the Guides/Rangers did activities like rock climbing, open-air swimming, horse riding, kayaking, and more! The site itself had carnival rides one day, and pig racing the next (yes, really!). We enjoyed it so much that we're already talking about going to Poacher in 2026. We hope this is going to kick start a more regular pattern of going to these jamborees to provide a slightly more affordable, and accessible, international adventure.

A more far flung adventure was that a group of 8 girls and 5 leaders joined a group from Banff and Buchan for a trip to Canada. They met up with friends made back at Ayrwaves 2017, met lots of Canadian Girl Guides, and enjoyed a stay at one of their campsites (although sleeping inside to avoid the bears! No, I'm not kidding).

We also had another joint training day with Ayrshire South, and I was particularly pleased that we managed to use the day specifically to support leaders in training by providing all of their 'formal' training in person, in one day. We also had a couple sessions on mental health awareness, led by our very own Hazel McSorley and Eilidh Gibson. It had great take up, and is possibly something we need to lean more into.



I also really enjoyed the wreath making we did in December! It was so much fun, and something a bit different.

When it comes to awards and honours – we've certainly had no shortage of them either!

We welcomed Isabel McNicoll and Irene McIlwain to our Vice President contingent. Both are wonderful ladies who've given a lot of time and energy to our County so I was really pleased to be able to extend the thanks and invite them to be Vice Presidents.

Helen Cooke of 1st Hurlford Guides also received the Scottish Chief Commissioner Award. Helen is my fellow leader at Guides, and was the one who encouraged and supported me in all my Guiding development so it was an honour to present the award to her. We managed to get a fair number of Guiding friends and family to surprise her at the end of the Unit meeting... so much so, she doesn't trust me anymore when I invite her to things or when I organise outdoor unit meetings!

We also have a new Queen's Guide in our County – Leah Finnigan. She completed the award in less than a year, having started it last summer when the age range increased. I got the opportunity to review her award and evidence and she did a really outstanding job – and has certainly set the bar high! Learning how to crochet; creating a pack with accessible games; joining Girlguiding Scotland's consultative group; and more.

And as a County we've definitely got momentum now in terms of Queen's Guide candidates. We have at least 4 people who've started in the last 12 months, and a bunch of the girls who went to Canada are interested, so it'll be exciting to see how they all get on!





In terms of young member awards, it's always a joy seeing them achieving the Gold Award – which takes so much hard work and perseverance. This year we also had two Kilmarnock Rangers achieve the Commonwealth Award – Erin Malcolm and Sophie McCabe.

At the last Annual Review we also launched a new initiative – Girlguiding Ayrshire North's Help Fund. This is something I was always keen to do and so I'm glad we made it reality. None of us want girls or volunteers to miss out on Guiding due to finances – but sometimes Units aren't able to subsidise, or there can be embarrassment/ shame from parents and they don't want to raise it with Unit Leaders. So this fund has parents apply directly to the County for the financial support they need – and so over the last 12 months we've given out £1500 to support specific young members and volunteers. This has mostly included vouchers for uniform, and helping cover subs for a term. The plan is to open this every term to support our members to continue in Guiding.

Finally, a really significant part of the year was bringing my term to a close and handing over to the new team. Being County Commissioner has truly been an honour, and it's hard to believe we were in COVID lockdown when I started. I extend a huge thanks to the rest of the team:

Catriona Gilmour and Mary Dunlop, Assistant County Commissioners - a great personal support to me and the ideal sounding boards! They did what was asked of them with poise, and never lost their sense of humour. Cheryl Campbell, County Treasurer – I knew we'd work well together, and we certainly did. We elevated how County finances are planned and handled – setting us up for even more success.

Ashley McDonald, Guiding Delivery Lead – she took the leap in being the first group to go international following COVID; and helped plan and run so many amazing County events, which created some of my favourite memories from the last four years.

Fiona Malcolm, Growth & Retention Lead – she's been so level-headed, reliable, and her team got us back on the right path of onboarding and supporting new volunteers post-covid.

Claire Liddell, Marketing Communications Advisor – from day one she's taken my ramblings and turned them into legible newsletters. She updated all our branding with ease, updated the website, and started the much loved throwback Thursdays on Facebook.

Kim Main, County President – always there when you need a reminder of why we do what we do!
